- Selected organizations will receive \$12,500 to begin implementing the action plan.
- Selected organizations will be proactive about creatively and safely engaging community members while abiding by local public health guidance limiting in-person gatherings.
- Selected organizations can focus their work on one park but will be encouraged to think about how to apply Safe Routes to Parks to parks system-wide.
