Safe Routes to School Federal Program - State of the States As of March 31, 2014

This chart details each state's progress on spending the funds remaining from the federal Safe Routes to School program that were provided from 2005-2012 under the SAFETEA-LU transportation bill. While the federal Safe Routes to School program has been consolidated into the Transportation Alternatives program as of FY2013, any leftover Safe Routes to School funds remain available until expended. All dollar figures cited are as of March 31, 2014.

Announced colums measure the amount of funding each state has announced for local grants and statewide spending—not including administrative expenses. These are the funds that will ultimately help local communities create safer routes to school.

Obligated columns reflect the amount that the state has expended or contracted to expend on Safe Routes to School, including local grants, statewide spending, and administrative expenses. Obligation is important as it demonstrates what level of funding has been or will soon be spent to date to build infrastructure projects, support non-infrastructure activities, and implement the program.
