Martin from Washington DC: recognizing that soem low income black and latino communities already use bikes (or have one in the garage) is important

Mary Crowe: Will this webinar address any specific programs for ADULTS? we are working on a program to provide bicycles to adults who are from socioeconomically disadvantaged backgrounds....so that they have transportation to/from the bus etc

This is a major topic here in Rochester as we struggle with the ever-increasing numbers of buses in otherwise walkable, bikeable urban neighborhoods. Very interested in learning more about your research on this topic.

Jon Cooper: Again, here in Houston we have numerous schools that have sidewalks

built with dedicated Safe Route sidewalks; should we try to ask for funding of the same type to improve cycling?

Calvin B Leman from Salmon, Idaho: Where can we get signs for bike route? Some of our work is at http://treegrower.org/about/Council/Bike%20Path.html

Robert Ping from SRTS National Partnership: Martin, I agree, bicycling can be easier for kids in tough neighborhoods, and most families do have bikes, but they may be in disrepair, toy bikes, or folks are worried about using them for fear of theft or traffic safety or bullies.

Alison Mendoza from Washington, DC: Or The Bike House?

Kim Stanley from Santa Barbara, CA: Robert: Any specific ideas about how to encourage Latinos to get out of their status symbol cars and join the walkers and cyclists? Max Bushell from Chapel Hill: The Walk Friendly Communities program could be of interest for Milwaukee.

Roy Dudley from United States: Wow! I am moving to Wisconsin tomorrow! Here in Mexico the streets are trenches, not streets!

jake e newborn from milwaukee: hey that's my shop! Valid Bike shop Milwaukee, WI **Rachel Morris from Ventura, CA:** Officials want proof that people already are biking before they put funds in that direction. Changes take years. Catch 22! How do we communicate and advocate?

Mari Lynch from Monterey: Kim, Latinos are high percentage of cyclists in Monterey County.

Curtis Royston from St. Louis, Mo: I read a story about that shop online somewhere. Hannah Hardy from Pittsburgh: Another issue is two working parent homes/single family homes. It is hard for me to encourage biking because of time and my need to get to work in order to be able to be home at the end of school.

Ben Ortiz from Cornell University, Ithaca, NY: Kim, for starters, don't generalize in such a disparaging way.

Nora Cody from Oakland, CA: Let's be careful not to stereotype communities with whom we wish to work

Carol Hussa: We did a bicycle pedestrian count two years in a row - provided proof to decision makers about the number of cyclists and pedestrians in our downtown streets.

Rachel Davidman from Oakland: Safe Routes to Schools Alameda County partner program Cycles of Change is about to begin the BikeMobile a mobile unit that will be able to go into communities and go to schools not only to fix bikes in disrepair but will also hold workshops and teach bike repair to older students.

[Private Message to all Presenters] - **Mary Crowe:** if you have non profit status you should be able to get bicycles from your police department (for free) from those that they have...

Rachel Morris from Ventura, CA: The issue is - people really aren't biking. YET... [Private Message to all Presenters] - **Mary Crowe:** thank you Rachel!

Kristi from Austin TX: Kim has a valid point, it's a real issue in many communities, and Robert just said we should not be afraid to talk about class and culture. It's a cultural barrier to walking/biking.

Curtis Royston from St. Louis, Mo: That last comment about the distance I would have to travel to ride with a local established group definitely applies to me. :-(

Jon Cooper: Ben, Nora: she put it poorly, but there are a large number of people in my

community who regard walking, cycling, and transit as low status. How do we change their minds.

Jon Cooper: ?

Megan Folkerth: Is anyone having problems with the sound cutting in and out? **Mari Lynch from Monterey:** Not surprisingly, bike rentals (let alone bike shares) are also not available in low-income communities

[Private Message to all Presenters] - **Mary Crowe:** homeless folks classify folks on 1) access to car or 2) access to a bicycle..those with bicycles are "second tier" but those with out a car or a bike are "third tier"

Way2Go from Ithaca, NY: My sound is ok.

Nora Cody from Oakland, CA: We don't try to change their minds -- we try to make bicycling and walking easier, more fun and more convenient. You will not win people over by disparaging their choices or directly challenging their lifestyles.

Rachel Davidman from Oakland: Safe Routes to Schools Alameda County's partner program Cycles of Change is about to launch the BikeMobile a mobile unit that will be able to go into communities and to schools not only to fix bikes in disrepair but to hold workshops and teach older students how to repair their bikes.

Tony Giron: Ah, Keith Holt - Active Trans misses you!

Ben Ortiz from Cornell University, Ithaca, NY: Let's recognize that cars are status symbols in most American communitites, no? Jon, well put.... *accurately* put.

eric bjorlin from Chicago, IL: Bike shop just out of city in Wauwatosa: 6916 W. North Avenue Johnson's http://www.johnsonsbikeshop.com/ possibly in yellow area

Roy Dudley from United States: We have lots of bamboo in Veracruz and are considerring making bamboo frame bikes similar to Calfee's coffee bike

Neil T Leifer from Newton, Mass: In Boston, we have earn-a-bike programs that enable youth to earn bikes through a multi-week program where they build up recycled bikes.

Robert Ping from SRTS National Partnership: Bamboo is beautiful frame material, and cheap, too!

jake e newborn from milwaukee: Eric -correct Johnsons is nearby sort of but lies in a subrub not the city and cops are not all that inviting of people of color in that area **Curtis Royston from St. Louis, Mo:** Is Patrick from B'Works St. Louis on this call???? [Private Message to all Presenters] - **Mary Crowe:** Neil T- we are working on that in Greensboro, NC

Roy Dudley from United States: We also make bamboo bike trailers and parking **Hannah Hardy from Pittsburgh:** http://freeridepgh.org/ Free Ride Pittsburgh, cool bike program/educational program for rebuilding bikes and learning about maintenance.

Gary Rose: Bicycling is a big part of the future. It has to be. There is something wrong with a society that drives a car to work out in a gym. - Bill Nye, scientist and producer of public TV science programs

Andy: I have yet to see bamboo bikes for sale under a few thousand dollars because they are all custom. Not something appealing to low income at this time

Roy Dudley from United States: Go to Facebook "Veracruzenbicicleta" to see what we are doing.

John Cinatl from Fresno, CA: Bike Bakersfield offers similar services Roy Dudley from United States: We recycle parts and can build them for less than US\$100

Frances Barbour from Tiburon, CA: There is also a merit badge for cycling w/Boys/Girls Scouts of America

Mari Lynch from Monterey: 4-H had Spanish language bike project books in Spanish; they're listed here; many apparently no longer in print (need updating--which would be great project for advocates). See here http://marilynch.com/blog/resources/en-espanol Nora Cody from Oakland, CA: Love these ideas - 4H and Scouts - for integrating

Tom Ezell from North Little Rock, AR: Boy scouts yes, but not yet for the Girl Scouts...

Cynthia Gibson from Boise, ID: Idaho is predominantly a rural state - does anyone have suggestions on how to best work in rural farming communities?

Christine Bourgeois from United States: In Santa Barbara, the Coalition offers youth Earn-A-Bike programs to Junior High schools. www.bicicentro.org/youth (bike mechanics & road riding)

Roy Dudley from United States: Reminds me of my Scout days in Boulder, CO 50 years ago!

Gary Rose: I have the same problem as Cynthia from Boise

cycling into existing youth programs.

Jon Cooper: Nora: Not talking about challenging or attacking culture BUT, yes, we are trying to change a part of lifestyle. So, how do you make cycling, etc, a better looking option? How do we bring it to their attention cheaply, without making it alienating or looking cheap?

Many Hispanic men bike here, far fewer womenthey tote babies, groceries etc. walking or by bus, rarely bike.

Ben Ortiz from Cornell University, Ithaca, NY: John S., great website. Thks for sharing.

Joy Marinelli from Boone, NC: Keith, do you find that many of the low income individuals you work with experience physical disability, and if so, do you have a plan to attempt to accommodate/include them in this bike plan?

Hannah Hardy from Pittsburgh: Good point about secure bike parking. I would imagine this is a similar issue with schools. If a kid rides to school, where can they park? [Private Message to Carole Frye from Rockingham, NC] - **Safe Routes to School**

The inmate who we trained as a bike mechanic, when his term was finished, said he could see himself in the neighborhood on weekends/evenings having his garage open, with KoolAid for all the kids who would come over to work on bikes with him:)

Kristi from Austin TX: Rural folks: There is lots of information on both national SRTS websites about implementing SRTS in rural areas.

Carole Frye from Rockingham, NC: yes, it is muffled

Andy: Of the more recent no-cycling policy schools, some even had a police officer waiting at the school in the morning to talk to the parents that rode with their kids to get to school. They always cite safety as the reason, but the only thing causing safety problems is other parents driving their kids to school. If they promoted cycling instead, drivers would be more used to cooperating with cyclists on the road - i.e. increasing safety

Curtis Royston from St. Louis, Mo: I read a story about that shop online somewhere. Hannah Hardy from Pittsburgh: Another issue is two working parent homes/single family homes. It is hard for me to encourage biking because of time and my need to get to work in order to be able to be home at the end of school.

Ben Ortiz from Cornell University, Ithaca, NY: Kim, for starters, don't generalize in such a disparaging way.

Nora Cody from Oakland, CA: Let's be careful not to stereotype communities with whom we wish to work

Carol Hussa: We did a bicycle pedestrian count two years in a row - provided proof to decision makers about the number of cyclists and pedestrians in our downtown streets.

Rachel Davidman from Oakland: Safe Routes to Schools Alameda County partner program Cycles of Change is about to begin the BikeMobile a mobile unit that will be able to go into communities and go to schools not only to fix bikes in disrepair but will also hold workshops and teach bike repair to older students.

Kristi from Austin TX: Kim has a valid point, it's a real issue in many communities, and Robert just said we should not be afraid to talk about class and culture. It's a cultural barrier to walking/biking.

Jon Cooper: Ben, Nora: she put it poorly, but there are a large number of people in my community who regard walking, cycling, and transit as low status. How do we change their minds.
